## **Editorial**

#### Family Life in Slovenia.

An average West European couple is well above 25 years of age when they have their first child. A similar trend is present in Slovenia, although the average age of women giving birth is somewhat lower. This is according to the survey on the position of women in Slovenia between 1990 and 1995, published by the Office for Women's Policy. The trend is mostly due to the so-called LAT ("living apart together") phenomenon denoting a child's prolonged living in the home of his or her parents even after completing their studies. In most cases, the young are economically dependant but socially independent of their parents.

Similarly, the fertility rate is also increasing in higher age groups with couples deciding to have their first child later than before. In 1994, the highest fertility rate was recorded between 25-29 years of age. 1995 showed age groups 30-34 and 35-39 as more active. Interestingly, the number of marriages has decreased, as have the number of divorces since 1992.

## 1.6 Million Tourists in 1996.

More than 1.6 million tourists visited Slovenia in 1996. 5% more than in the previous year. Compared with 1995, the number of Slovenian tourists fell. There were 825,005 Slovenian tourists recorded as staying at tourists sites, 2% less than in 1995. Conversely, the number of foreign tourists increased during the same period by 14% to 831,426.

#### The Oldest Musical Instrument.

The Ljubljana National Museum will house an exhibition called Neanderthal Man and His Flute up to June 8. A precisely perforated thigh-bone of the cavebear excavated by Dr Ivan Turk's team at the site of the Stone Age findings above the Idrijca River near the Sebrelje Plateau will occupy the central part of the exhibition devoted to the life of our ancestors. The research, including carbon dating study in the U.S. has proved the findings to be surprising. Up to now, a 35,000 year old bone pipe was considered to be the oldest music instrument made by man. The finding in Slovenia has marked the beginning of man's creativity back another 10,000 years in history.

#### Slovenia's Economy.

The Slovenian Chamber of Economy assessed the

current situation in Slovenia early this year. Also attending the session was the Governor of the Bank of Slovenia, Mr. France Arhar. He listed the reduction of inflation and a stable currency as the main goals for the central bank. He also stressed the need for extensive saving in Slovenia, which will lead the way to lower interest rates.

**NEWS FLASH** 

According to the Bank of Slovenia, the introduction of faxed rate for the national currency would be dangerous, though welcomed by the international community. The IMF (International Monetary Fund) reproached the Bank of Slovenia for not introducing the fixed rate, which was introduced by the currencies of the Visegrad Group countries. According to the Governor, a fixed rate results in growth of domestic prices and salaries, higher domestic consumption, reduction of exports etc. "We have been proving to the IMF that our current flexible rate is more efficient for the countries in transition than the fixed rate, which resulted in a considerable minus in the balance of payments in the Visegrad Group of countries."

## Australian Slovenians on VTV Television.

Kristina & Wendy Cestnik recently appeared as guests on a one hour children's program "Miš-mas" which was shown on regional television VTV in Slovenia. The theme of the program. was life in Australia. The conversation flowed easily, and viewers discovered many previously unknown facts about Australia. Kristina also displayed her considerable singing talents with a live performance.

#### Fr. Ciril Bosic Visits Australia.

The welcome mat was rolled out for Fr. Ciril Bosic who visited Australia in late April. Fr Ciril, who assisted Fr. Valerijan Jenko at St Rafael's Church, was also visiting Australia to collect paintings by the famous Slovenian Australia artist Stanislav Rapotec, for showing in Slovenia. Travelling with him to Australia was the Koperian priest Franci Trstenjak, the director of the radio program Radio Ognjišce Ljubljana. Radio Ognjišce began transmitting in Nov 1994 and on the Internet in April 1997. Internet Address: pnm.//193.95.231.105:7070/ognjisce. �

There have now been 14 issues, 2 issues in two colour which had 24 pages and were distributed to about 650 people. Some of the regular features are history. cooking, regional profile, letters to the editor, news page and the social pages. There have been three poster-type calendars produced. We now have support from a variety of businesses and clubs, who advertise regularly.

The team has had about 100 meetings with an average of 10 people giving a total of 2000 hours combined effort, with at least another 2000 hours taken for production, editorial and marketing.

The most controversial articles were "Gays in Slovenia", "Who cares about the Slovenian Language" and "Why have two clubs in Sydney".

The 'career' of the ASR culminated late last year in 'A Sunday Rendezvous' which saw about 400 people attend Club Triglay. Despite some difficulties the day was an unqualified success. This shows much can be achieved through team effort, careful planning and sheer hard work.

The cost to produce a regular issue of the ASR in the old format (Spring 1996) is a total of \$560 with distribution costs of \$262, giving a total of \$822.83. The cost to produce the 1997 Calendar and the Summer 1996 issue, together with its distribution was a total of \$1,753.20. Based on these last two issues the cost of producing and distributing the ASR for a full year is about \$4,200.

On a personal level, involvement with the ASR has also provided an opportunity for a group of people to develop skills in communication, publishing and running a financially sound credible forum. This group has received respect and recognition from the Slovenian community. Networks have been established and grown. Confidence in the ability of the group to act as a successful team has also evolved.

#### The ASR Team

A successful team is made up by different types of people. To break up the day and learn more about ourselves, and what others think about us, a team building exercise was conducted. Team members were asked to evaluate each other and determine whether someone was a 'day dream believer', 'mother hen', 'jester', 'nervous Nellie', 'bull dog', 'whistle blower', 'keeper of the faith', 'compromiser' or 'mover and

shaker'. The most popular characteristics were the mover and shaker, keeper of the faith and instigator. The lowest scoring were the daydream believer and mother hen. For a successful team we need lots of movers and shakers, instigators and day dream believers. We're almost there! Perhaps we should pull out that old 'Monkees' album and start day dream believing.

#### Developing the Vision

One of the main reasons for having a Strategic Planning day was to provide the ASR team with a road map showing where they are now and where it is they want to go. Sounds easy, well let me tell you it wasn't. I've never seen a group so dedicated to reaching a consensus position that every word of the mission statement was discussed, debated and finally agreed to, and I mean every word. Who would ever think that coming up with one statement would take most of the afternoon.

During the day another issue discussed was whether to incorporate the ASR. What does this mean? Incorporation creates a legal entity separate from the individual ASR members.

# Life at St Rafael's in the wake of Sisters' departure

On our way to the traditional blessing of Easter foods at St Rafael's Church in Merrylands, my daughter asked "Mummy, when will sr Francka and sr Hilarija return to Australia?" Truly, I had been thinking about this myself, as we all hoped to have received an affirmative response from Slovenia, but to date and to our disappointment the response is still unclear.

Who better knows and feels this disappointment than Fr Valerijan. Suddenly he has been left very alone. When I asked him what feelings he had in those first few days after sisters' departure, he thought for a little while and said: "I felt very confused and disappointed and to some extent even cheated. Sisters' work was always productive and furthermore very necessary for our Slovenian church and in fact invaluable to the wider Slovenian community."

The community was sincerely concerned for Fr Valerijan's well-being. Those of us, who know him, know that he is not one to complain, but it simply was not right, that suddenly his workload now encompassed a myriad of non-pastoral work and had increased at least two hundredfold. Fr Valerijan gets through this work mostly on his own with the help of some dedicated volunteers within the St Rafael's Church community.

February brought with it a sigh of relief when Fr Method, fresh from Slovenia (via America), came to St Rafael's to start his pastoral work in Sydney. The community is extremely happy to have him here. He's currently "acclimatising" to Australian life and to us, the Sydney Slovenian community.

Before their departure, the sisters cleared up a lot of outstanding work in and around the church, however, there is still plenty which Fr Valerijan has to do on an ongoing basis. For example printing the Weekly Bulletin "Nedelja" and the community publication "Rafael", he also has to organise the Sunday mass readers and lots, lots more.

Sr Francka was responsible for all the administrative work, she maintained the Church's data bases on the computer, coordinated and disseminated the rosters for the volunteers of the various work groups, not to mention the tender loving care she bestowed on the flower beds in the church grounds.

Mrs Sonia Fisher has now taken over tending the garden beds, she adorns the altar with fresh floral arrangements and also prepares the lettering above the altar. After Sunday masses she takes care of religious literature sales, rosary beads and calendars etc. which had previously been done by Sr Hilarija.

Sr Hilarija was responsible for the more domestic duties around St Rafael's eg: cooking, washing, ironing and the weekly grocery shopping etc. Currently this is carried out by two ladies who gladly help out.

Sr Francka was also very involved in music. She led the church choirs in Sydney, Newcastle, Canberra and Wollongong. She also led the Slovenian men's choir "Triglav" in Sydney which has now disbanded as a result of her departure. The St Rafael's Church choir has had to cut back their weekly practices but still manages to keep together with Martin Bleesing playing the organ for them from time to time.

Fr Valerijan is still trying to maintain his visits to Slovenians living outside the Sydney metropolitan area. He continues to visit Wagga-Wagga and Queensland even though it's much more difficult now without Sr Francka as his co-driver. On the longer journeys he does ask for help, which is gladly given by our volunteers.

The students and teachers at Slomskova Sola (Saturday afternoon school at St Rafael's) particularly miss the sisters. This year there are 14 students and two teachers who are parents of a couple of the students.

Up to her departure, sr Francka taught the students. She chose and prepared the content of lessons, arranged photocopying and organised student performances for Mother's Day and Father's Day and at Christmas time for St Nicholas' visit (sv. Miklavz).

All this work is now carried out by the two voluntary teachers along with some help from the parents of those who attend school, and thankfully since his arrival, with the help of Fr. Methodius.

Sr Francka's absence is especially felt during singing practice which the children particularly look forward to at the end of their formal lessons. During her time teaching at the school, sr Francka taught the children many lovely Slovenian songs. This year however, the students will not be learning any new Slovenian songs despite the best efforts of the current teachers who diligently keep up practice of the songs the children already know. Going over the same songs however, may not be enough for these "eager beavers".

Sr Hilarija also played a role at the Slomskova Sola. She never forgot the mid-lesson break and would always prepare fully laden trays of delicious sweets and refreshing juice for the students. She was always a welcome face and the children became very fond of her. Now the students have to bring their own refreshments.

Sr Francka always espoused to teaching the "good" Slovenian word and she would frequently describe the beauty of Slovenia to her students and in turn they would eagerly tell her of what they already knew of Slovenia. Sr Francka was keen to enrich the students with an awareness of their heritage, the Slovenian culture and language.

The current teachers of Slomskova Sola will continue to keep the school open, even though things may not run as smoothly as they would if the sisters were still in Sydney. The students still ask about the sisters' return.

Both sisters are sadly missed, but at the same time, as Fr Valerijan says, the community has been fortunate to have had them with us for some 30 years. Both carried out various and demanding work and both happily took part in the Slovenian community's life.

We wish them well in Slovenia and hope that perhaps one day we may meet them again in Australia.

## Slovenian Association Sydney



n 1957 a small group of Slovenians started the "Slovenian Association Sydney" (Slovensko Društvo Sydney - SDS) at Woollahra. The main reason for the formation was to provide a gathering place for newly settled Australian Slovenians, so they could socialise with people from a similar background.

In the beginning there were a variety of places that were hired for functions, such as the St Frances Church at Oxford Street Paddington and also the Paddington Town Hall. These places were also used by the Church to hold traditional events such as midnight mass.

The following people were the first Committee Members: Fr Bernard Ambrozic, Mrs V Cergol, Mr J Cujes, Mr L Klakocer, Mr J Klemencic, Mr M Lajovec (President), Mr J Perko, Mr S Pevec, Mr L Urbancic (Secretary), and Miss T Vodopivec.

Before long there were a grand total of 130 (approx) members and a growing numbers of applicants. A small group of Slovenians formed a company called "Slovenski Dom Pty Ltd", which purchased a house at No. 7 Metropolitan Road, Enmore. This house was owned by a group of shareholders. One of which was the SDS. In 1962 it was decided that as there were no

benefits to the SDS with regard to holding functions etc, that the house should be sold. The meetings were then temporarily held in the home of Mr L Kmetic. In 1963 a choir was formed which also regularly shared his home for choir practice.

Later, these events moved to the home of Miss T Vidopivec at Croydon Park. In January 1965 a fund raising committee named "Akcije za Dom" was formed to raise money so that the Slovenians could have a place of their own. Initially there were three people chosen as trustees of the funds raised, they were Fr Valerian Jenko, Mr V Ovijac and Mr A Breznik

Land was bought at 45 Ferrers Road, Horsley Park in 1968. The property was quite large and included small house that was later modified to include a dance area. Due to a clash of ideas in March 1971, a general meeting was held which resulted in a number of people leaving the SDS and subsequently forming "Club Triglav".

In 1974, construction of the club began and the property remained the home of SDS until 1987, at which time Fairfield City Council offered to move the Club to the property at 2-10 Elizabeth Street, Wetheril Park in return for the property at Ferrers Road. This was an offer too good to refuse, and therefore was accepted.



Last year's winners, Ireland, hosted the 42nd Eurovision Song Contest at the Point Theatre in Dublin, Ireland. The aim of the song contest is to promote new and previously un-published works among European member nations and to broadcast the event live throughout Europe. Through a process of elimation, the winning finalist represents their country in the annual inter-European musical show-down. The most famous Eurovision Song winners were the Swedish group ABBA, but many other popular artists such as Cliff Richard, Bucks Fizz, Duran Duran and Julio Iglesias have also competed at the contest. The former Yugoslavia won the contest in 1989. In Australia, the Song Contest was a delayed telecast shown on Sunday, 4th May at 7:30pm on SBS television.

On the night, Katrina and the Waves from the UK were runaway winners with a record-breaking score total of 227 points. The song "Love Shine A Light" won the hearts and minds of jurors throughout Europe with all judges awarding points for the UK song. The score eclipsed Ireland's 1994 performance by one point.

Katrina and the Waves had an international smash hit in 1985 with Walking on Sunshine and were considered 3 to 1 favourites along with Ireland to win the Eurovision title. Since her 1985 smash hit, Katrina and the Waves have been kept busy touring with international bands, including the Beach Boys, Fleetwood Mac and Don Henley. Katrina was overjoyed with the win and rather nervous during the reprise of the winning song.

Slovenia's song "Zbudi Se" (Wake Up) was sung by Tanja Ribic. The song was composed by Sasa Losic with lyrics written by Zoran Predin. This effort by Slovenia was world class compared with previous year's and the 10th placing was well deserved considering the high standard of this years entries.

Tanja Ribic was born in 1968 in Trbovlje. During her school years she sang in a school band, and went on to study drama at the University of Ljubljana. When she graduated in 1991 she joined the Civic Theatre of Ljubljana, where she is a leading comedy and character actress.



## Lonely Planet Travel Survival Kit

Slovenia - (1st Edition) Lonely Planet Travel Survival By Steve Fallon Lonely Planet Publications 1995 RRP \$18.95

Have you ever tried to find a tourist bureau in Slovenia? I have. I eventually found one. To the best of my knowledge, there is only one in the entire country. Of course I may be wrong, but it sure was difficult to find one of those elusive offices. I just wanted to know all the wonderful places and sites I should visit. Relatives weren't too helpful either. Sure, they live in the country, but that is all they do there. Live and work. I found that generally they don't spend a great deal of time being tourists in Slovenia. (This is not altogether uncommon in any country - how many times have you spent the day pretending to be a tourist in your home town?)

Normally when I travel, I take the Lonely Planet Guide for the particular country with me - but on my last holiday overseas, there was no such thing for Slovenia. Fear no more! It now exists! If you are planning to go to Slovenia in the near or distant future and you want to explore the country, I suggest you get yourself a copy of the Lonely Planet Guide to "Slovenia". (Don't bother if you only want to do the 'relative hop'.)

The book contains practical information for the traveller in Slovenia. First and foremost, there are there, etc. quite a few maps included, from the overall map of Slovenia, to more detailed regional maps, and finally to road maps of the centres of many major towns and cities.

The opening chapter of the guide provides facts about Slovenia. Included are historical facts from Palaeolithic times through to the modern day (don't worry - it's not a heavy history book - this

entire period is covered in under ten small pages). There are also facts about the geography, climate, economy, arts and culture. Useful for those people that do not speak Slovenian is a mini (very mini) dictionary of words and phrases travellers may need to use. Following this, a number of chapters present other information that is useful for travellers to Slovenia, such as customs details, post and telecommunications, and public transport information.

Once all of the general information has been covered, the book deals with every region of Slovenia in detail. For each region you can find out where to change money, where to get your laundry done (if you are not staying with relatives), and places to stay, from the bottom of the range to the most expensive, depending upon your taste or budget. The authors even include the telephone and fax numbers of the various hotels and guest houses.

If you are hungry, recommendations are made on where to find food. If you want some entertainment, this too is covered in the book, from the theatre, to cinema, to jazz and rock music. There are many ideas on what to see and do, including information on opening times (which are correct at time of printing). In fact, there are so many places listed that I would challenge any 'native' Slovenian to be able to tell you where each of them is, what there is to see

This is definitely the book to have if you are seeking to get the most out of your holiday in Slovenia. The author clearly states that discounts or payments are never accepted for positive coverage in the book. As a result, the advice offered in the book is independent and free from bias (apart from any preferences that the author may have). I wouldn't leave home without it! \*

## Regional Profile



A Skier's Winter Paradise

his year's ski season in Slovenia may be coming to an end but it is just gearing up in Australia. Similarly, as Australia heads for summer, Slovenia is ready for skiing again! Thus, skiing enthusiasts can partake in their sport almost all year round. Of course this means flying to Slovenia for their winter but as a bonus you also get to see the relatives!

Another advantage of skiing in Slovenia is the cost compared to other parts of Europe. Sure, you might run into Princess Di at San Moritz or Cortina D'Ampezzo, but at least your ski dollar will go further in Slovenia!

Slovenians have been skiing for more than three centuries. Sport skiing was developed after the first world war and at that time Slovenians were recognised as being the oldest skiing nation in Central Europe. Many competitions are held in the Slovenian ski resorts. Slovenia hosts the annual World Cup competitions in cross-country skiing, the Men's World Cup Alpine Skiing Competition in Kranjska Gora and the women's competition in Maribor. There are competitions

in skiing, ski-flight, ski jump and crosscountry. These competitions cater for professional and amateur athletes. One of the better known competitions is the crosscountry where skiers run in the triangle of land between Slovenia, Austria and Italy. This has led to ideas of holding the Winter Olympics in this triangle, jointly co-ordinated by the three countries in question.

Apart from skiing, the ski centres and the locations offer other recreational activities. Bled offers ice-skating trips to the island and the castle. At Bohinj you can, with the aid of an experienced climber. climb frozen waterfalls. Most other locations also offer activities other than skiing including cultural activities such as the Kobarid Museum at Kobarid which features

many artefacts from the First World War. There are also numerous churches, castles and museums to visit. Other forms of entertainment are the many clubs, gostilnas and discos that help numb the pain of a long days skiing! \*

For a small country there certainly is a big choice of skiing areas. Slovenia has thirty seven skiing locations and forty seven ski centres. The table (Centre for Tourist and Economic Promotion at the Chamber of Economy of Slovenia, 1994, 'A Merry Wintertime on the Sunny Side of the Alps') shows the ski areas, length of runs, facilities available for skiing and recreation, and other information that may be useful to those planning a ski trip to Slovenia. This table is an excellent and concise reference point for choosing which area and location best suits the needs of the avid skier. 💠

## **Memories**

# **A Story of Proud Parents**



Gleaming through a box of old photographs, I found this photo which brought back a little bit of history for me. It was a photo taken in late 1961 of our two little boys.

Their father was a very proud young man, working long hours like so many other young fathers did at the time. We lived in one room, sharing the kitchen, bathroom/toilet and laundry with 4 other families. It was a mixture of people - Australians, Slovenians, Germans and Polish. We couldn't speak each others' language but we tried to be friendly and helpful to one another. Every day, I tried to learn a few words of English,

My husband would bring home a weekly pay packet of \$13, which with overtime, could go up to as much as \$18. Every Friday it was my responsibility to go to the bank and deposit \$5 into our savings account, \$5 went towards our rent and \$2-\$3 was spent on our groceries, clothing and my husband's weekly train fare to work. At that time, I made all the children's clothing from cheap cuts of materials. Any extras or treats came out of overtime money, such as a few bottles of beer, maybe ice-cream on Sundays or buying presents for birthdays, Mother's Day or Father's Day.

In 1962, I became pregnant again and soon after we bought our block of land. We built our 'castle' on it a 3 bedroom fibro house. In August of that year we moved in. What a happy time this was for us! From one bedroom to 3 bedrooms, our own kitchen, bathroom and toilet. I can still remember with a smile, how one could go to the 'out house' toilet, in the middle of the night, in the middle of the yard, leave the door open and count the stars!

In early 1963, our beautiful daughter was born. How her brothers loved her then, and it's still so wonderful to see the bond between them now. Now they are all married and have enriched our family with daughters and a son in law. We now have 6 beautiful grandchildren, who just love to come and stay over, slide on the stair railings, make lots of mess, noise just like our children used to do! So, you see, we are never lonely.

This story will end as it began; with a reference to the photo. This photo was in the wallet of the proud father for 33 years! It travelled everywhere with him. Over the years the wallet fell apart, the picture lost its corners, but the family love is still around and going strong!

Come and visit one Sunday afternoon, have a chat, 'kavico' and maybe some other 'goodies'. We can talk about old times and look at photos that bring back many lovely memories. \*

## Media Watch

#### Cleo April 1997

In the HOT SPOTS section of Cleo a short piece on Slovenia with a traditional photo of Bled. The article stated that "Slovenia is an emerging hip destination...it's an interesting mix of Eastern and Western Europe. Just a day trip from Vienna, Venice or Budapest, this tiny green country of castles offers the best of Europe, without the crowds." Wouldn't you like to go?

#### The Sun-Herald April 13 1997

In a story titled "Schools fail maths test", there was a table showing the results of the International Maths/Science Study. This table listed the scores of 20 countries in order of results (1 being highest and 20 being lowest). Slovenia was marked at 10th place whilst Australia was placed 16th.

## The Times (London) April 17 1997

This newspaper article was sent to us by a reader in London. It features a huge photo of Bled and the headline reads "Slovenia attracts sharp increase in British visitors". ## Cooking



## Ingredients:

1/2 litre milk 100 grams butter 80 grams sugar 180 grams semolina 5 eggs I cup sultanas Lemon rind

## Grisov Narastek - Baked Semolina

by Jenny Stariha

This dish is a popular winter dessert, especially when served with a fruit compote. For best results, use the thicker granule semolina not the fine one.

#### Method

- Preheat oven to 180°C.
- Grease baking dish and sprinkle with breadcrumbs.
- Bring milk to boil, add salt and semolina, stirring until semolina thickens.
- Separate eggs. Beat whites until firm peaks form.
- Cream the butter and sugar until fluffy and light, then add egg yolks, lemon rind and sultanas - mix well.
- Add cool semolina and continue mixing.
- Fold in egg whites.
- Transfer mixture to baking dish and bake in moderate oven for 35-45 minutes

### Fresh Fruit Compote

Select the fruit you would like (eg. plums, peaches apples etc). Wash, peel and cut the fruit. Boil water, adding sugar (to taste), lemon peel and a cinnamon stick. Place fruit in boiling water and boil until fruit softens. Cool the compote and serve with your baked pudding. \*



Dear ASR team,

I wish to congratulate you for your dedication and devotion to the ASR newspaper. I have many times admired your work and commiserated the fact that you are not able to devote some of your space to the Slovenian language. Many Slovenian publications devote some pages to English after many years of printing when some of their readers are not able to understand them any more. You have unfortunately started from the opposite direction. Maybe you can start using some Slovenian now and eventually end with an all Slovenian language newspaper. This is not to say that I do not appreciate and recognise the advantages of the English publication.

A few years ago I translated a magnificent Slovenian article into English, written by Mirko Javornik about the advantages of speaking Slovenian. It was published at Celovec in the Mohorjev koledar for 1988. I am sending it to you and I am sure that it will broaden your horizons. I also sincerely hope you will give your readers the benefit of knowing this extraordinary work by publishing it. It seems the perfect article for your paper. I personally am not able to advance the writer's arguments for the use of the Slovenian language any further, however I would like to make a few observations. They are made in the hope that some of you young people will become more open to the Slovenian language.

The English speaking world is totally self

centred and those who refuse to pen to another language are following the same narrow-minded outlook. Most other cultures value the knowledge of languages and give employees allowances for every other language spoken. In Slovenia an employee in the foreign affairs must command at least two foreign languages whereas in Australia only English is required. A language does not only open the window to communication with other people it also opens the door to the secrets of other cultures.

Our early Slovenian settlers, under the duress of assimilation have made irreparable damage to many migrant children. Wrongly convinced that their children would have an advantage by speaking the broken English they imposed it on them at the same time denying them the advantage of knowing a second language. Many parents were perhaps unable to give their children the incentive they needed for learning and many of the children defied them outright. All this is water under the bridge. However, people of your caliber and education can still recoup most of what was lost.

You might perhaps ask me why I take this view. You will find most of the answers in the article I included on the floppy disk. The scarce Slovenian human and money resources should not be divided further. The pride expressed in ASR for the Slovenian achievements at the Olympics is

noteworthy but it is short lived. For how many generations can such pride exist? Where will the next generation of Slovenians get the urge to even look at Slovenian news if it can not understand a word of that foreign language? A nation without the language is not a nation it is not even an ethnic group. At best, it is a pressure group. The person that robs himself of his or her parents language robs not only himself but all his descendants! Do you want to do that? But remember, it is tough to be a Slovenian.

The best your paper can do for all the young people of Australia is to start a Slovenian language course. I warmly recommend it to you. I wish you all the success and greet you joyfully.

Your letter is very sincere and a view that has been presented to us (although not always as eloquently) in the past. We appreciate the value of keeping the Slovenian language alive, as do we agree that print should be easily available to those members of our small community who wish to access it. It is therefore fortunate that we have organisations of high quality who both teach our language and who keep our community informed using their home language. We are in no way trying to take on either of these roles or compete with those that are doing this job so well. Our aim is to broaden the knowledge and interest levels of our generation (and indeed

those older and younger if they wish) on the topics of Slovenia and our Australian Slovenian community.

As you are aware, our publication is free to our readers. It is not free to produce or indeed mail, thus we are limited in the length of article we can afford to produce. Every bit of space is precious. We are realistic enough to accept that fewer people are able to (or motivated to) read in Slovenian. In order for them to gain information on what is happening within their extended community they need to read it in English. To take this away from them would only isolate them further from their Slovenian roots. On the other hand to duplicate our information would be extremely costly and time consuming and therefore could jeopardize the continuation of our publication.

We have always been committed to offering information to our readers on how to go about contacting the different language programs available to them we have not however pretended to be language educators ourselves. We also hope that those readers who wish to subscribe to publications such as 'Glas Slovenije', 'Misli', 'Raphael' and any other publication that can extend their knowledge of written Slovenian would do so (and I'm sure many do). These publications offer excellent information and are easy to receive and therefore we believe that our poor attempt at producing something in Slovenian would be superfluous.

We will endeavour to print the article you have supplied us with and I assure you that we do have a great respect for the Slovenian language but feel that our target group is in deeper need of being encouraged to participate in our community in a way that is interesting and easy. Our community is shrinking and we are actively and possibly controversially trying to bring it closer together. Ed


